Search firm takes input from Fredonia campus & community on presidential search

Though the search for Fredonia's new president may be confidential due to a SUNY-wide policy change, the search firm Storbeck/Pimentel & Associates is still taking the campus community's opinion into account throughout the process.

The firm was on campus Thursday, Dec. 5 and Friday, Dec. 6 for open forums regarding the search.

The Friday forum was led by Storbeck/Pimentel partner Stephen Leo, who opened the forum with a brief explanation of how the search will work alongside some credentials of the firm before opening up the floor to questions and comments.

"We are beginning recruiting very soon," said Leo at the forum. "As soon as we have the materials from working with the search committee, which we hope to have within the next week or two ... we're anticipating that the search committee will be going to begin interviewing candidates probably in February [or] March. We're expecting that candidates will be advanced to the [SUNY] chancellor sometime in April or May ... '

After the floor was opened up to questions, the anxieties and ideas about the confidential process within the campus community became apparent.

Numerous comments were made about diversity inclusion, as well as campus cohesion, with multiple commenters saying that the university hasn't seemed to have a definitive direction over the last number of years, as well as a lack of school spirit, pride and communication among campus groups.

One attendee, a resident director on campus, harped on the idea that minority groups on campus have had "awful" communication with the school's administration.

She went on to mention that during Fredonia's Big Blue Week, events seemed to exist on islands, where one group was having one event on one day and another group had an event on the next, with little to no crossover or communication between organizations.

A faculty member from academic advising felt that that lack of communication was a fundamental problem facing Fredonia.

"I find that in my work, that there's lots of amazing things happening at Fredonia in silos, and there's not a good communication plan on our campus to know who's doing what, even around the same areas," she said. "Our main form of communication is email. When we need to get in touch



On Saturday, Nov. 30, the men's hockey team won the Castleton University Invitational. Unfortunately, an unintentional situation has taken away some luster from that big win.

The hockey team celebrated in the locker room after the win. The players were jumping up and down and shoutsinging along to a song playing on a speaker.

This sort of thing happens in 99 percent of locker rooms around the country after a big team win.

The official Fredonia State hockey team Twitter account posted the clip on its page, and it was later re-tweeted by the Fredonia State Athletics account.

At first glance, the video is harmless, until you take a look at the song's lyrics. As is a commonality in many current pop songs, the song contained vulgarities, some of them derogatory. When some members of the department and student-athletes saw the video and knew the song, they brought it to the attention of Fredonia Athletic Director Jerry Fisk.

After taking a closer look at the posted clip and the lyrics, the athletic department thought it was in everyone's best interest to delete the post from Twitter. Shortly after, Fisk released a statement to all Fredonia's athletes and athletic staff addressing the issue.

"A video was recently posted to a social media account connected to a Fredonia State athletic program," he wrote. "I do not believe the content represents the best of Fredonia State Athletics and what we stand for. We should — and will do better."

When asked if he thought this social media situation took anything away from the wins, Fisk stated, "I don't think it takes away from the tournament championship, but I think it creates mindfulness, pulls us back and reminds us we have to be better at everything. [The men's hockey team] had a tough start to the season, but showed great heart and guts up in Vermont. The wins stand for themselves, but this situation makes us reflect and keeps working on many fronts."

The challenge for the future is how to censor content fairly without hindering creativity. Jerry Fisk had some thoughts on that as well.

"What will happen moving forward is before the Athletic Department re-tweets anything, there will be a more careful review of the content," he said.

Senior art students display pieces at 'Processus Imperium'

From graphic design to bronze statues, some of Fredonia's senior art students presented their work at "Processus Imperium" on its opening night — Friday, Dec. 6.

The show features work from Adanna Akams, Anais Cantres, Kai Ellsworth, Kristin Johnson, Katherine Williamson and Stephen Williamson.

The works of Akams and Cantres exhibit portraits of women that may be underrepresented in contemporary society.

Through digital creation, Akams depicts underrepresented women in her work.

She creates these pieces with dark backgrounds and colors that contrast against the women's purple and blue hair and dramatic makeup and jewelry.

Cantres describes her work as, "a creative exploration that constantly breaks the cliches of women archetypes in animations and paintings to promote cultural paradigm shifts."

Cantres uses vibrant colors and flowers — but contrasts them with her other works that are darker and more eerie.

The darker portraits feature skeletons and hands around her neck to provoke the audience. These images are a reflection of sleep paralysis and attempt to show the audience the effects it



can have on someone.

Kai Ellsworth's pieces are bronze, genderless statues. He said, "If you look closely, the faces are like mannequins, signifying disconnection and disempowerment in American society."

One of his statues features a figure stretching out of its arm on its knees. This may be interpreted as the statue feeling disempowered through what looks like a cry for help.

Stephen Williamson's piece, titled "Tyro" is a framework meant to help better understand our concept of reality.

His work features sketches, drawings and a variety of shapes — which mostly comprise of circles and squares.

Williamson says the circles and squares represent "completeness

and stability," which are characteristics of the word tyro — a Latin word that translates to "a beginner in learning or understanding."

Kristin Johnson uses her graphic design skills and her personal experience as a diabetic to create a book dedicated to diabetes awareness.

Johnson said, "The inspiration for my piece is the fact that I've lived with diabetes since the age of 4, how people react to finding out I have diabetes and the misinformation that comes along with people talking about diabetes."

The book features dark, cool-toned photos that display aspects of the disease. For instance, there is a page dedicated to insulin with a photo of a needle to demonstrate the process.

Johnson said the overall message behind her artwork is, "To bring awareness to diabetes and maybe have people better understand what a diabetic goes through on a daily basis."

Each artist displays their own unique and personalized message into their artwork. Through the pieces, the audience can see the passion each of these student artists have.

The "Processus Imperium: Senior Show" was a creative and eclectic exhibition that truly showcased the talent of each artist.

You still have some time to see the exhibit if you haven't yet, as it runs through Dec. 12 at 4 p.m. The event is free and open to the public.



Hannah and Matt on music Issue 5: The greatest of the decade

Hannah's Choice: "I Love You, Honeybear" by Father John Misty

Matt's Take: I have heard so much about Father John Misty over the years, and always great things. So, when Hannah recommended the album "I Love You, Honeybear" for an issue covering the greatest albums of the decade, I became even more excited to dive into his music.

My only regret following my first-time listen of the album is that I didn't get into his music sooner. I expected Father John Misty to be a wildly talented artist following all the acclaim that I heard, but I really got into this album, and I didn't want to leave.

It was nice to hear an unbelievably talented folk singer deliver this kind of lovely music with songs like the titular track "I Love You, Honeybear," and as a folk music fan, I cannot urge people to listen to this album enough.

The guitar work on this album is perfectly matched with Father John Misty's angelic voice. This album sounds so smooth on all fronts, and I need more.

Thanks to Hannah's recommendation, I will be diving further into Misty's discography following this review, and I hope that all of you readers that are inexperienced with his work do the same.

Three Standout Tracks: "I Love You, Honeybear," "Chateau Lobby #4 (in C for Two Virgins)" and "Strange Encounter." Score: 9.2/10

Hannah's Take: Love him or hate him, Father John Misty is one of the most interesting figures in modern alternative music (at least in my opinion). A true storyteller, "I Love You, Honeybear" seeks to tell the story of him and his beloved wife, Emma. From the beginning, listeners are exposed to romantic piano renderings and passionate vocals that can only be performed by someone deeply in love.

The album isn't all classic and reminiscent of the 50's, though, as displayed in one of my favorites from the record, "True Affection." The electronic opening fades into FJM's sweet vocals to continue the love story that everyone sort of hopes will happen to them someday. While the piano and guitar seemingly carry the album, I believe that FJM's lyricism is unmatched.

"Holy Shit" is the perfect example of this. "Oh, and no one ever really knows you, and life is brief. So I've heard, but what's that gotta do with this black hole in me?" He really knows how to get you feeling both existential and in love, all at once. I wouldn't have it any other way.

Fun fact: FJM and Emma met at a grocery store, the inspiration for the final track "I Went To The Store One Day." This romanticism and passion got me through the later half of the decade. Perhaps it will send me off into more romantic daydreams through the 2020s.

Matt's Choice: "The Money Store" by Death Grips



Matt's Take: When Hannah picked the theme of "Greatest Album of the Decade" for this week's issue of Hannah and Matt on music, I knew I had to think long and hard about what I would write about.

The first few albums that I thought about all had a special place in my heart, most notably "My Beautiful Dark Twisted Fantasy" and "Yeezus" by Kanye West, "Born to Die" by Lana Del Rey and "Blackstar" by David Bowie, but all of these albums have already been talked about to no end in discussions regarding the best/most influential albums of the 2010s.

With "The Money Store" by Death Grips, I wanted to explore a completely unique album that is not nearly held in as high a regard as it deserves. Ever since I listened to "The Money Store" for the first time, I knew that Death Grips were a musical force to be reckoned with, a talent that is so indescribably ingenius. With the aggressive screaming vocal style of MC Ride, the non-stop synth sounds and looping present throughout the album, and just profanely angry feel the album gives off, I am surprised to this day that I love this album as much as I do since it is not the music that I typically listen (see my reviews of "Bossanova" and "Zerwee").

Known as a meme band by many on the internet, Death Grips display undeniable talent on "The Money Store" that everyone, no matter what their musical preference, owes themselves to experience at least once in their lifetime. This album holds a very special place in my heart, and to this day I cannot explain exactly what I love about it since the album is such an ugly sound. I guess the unexplainable beauty underneath the ugliness is a huge factor in my admiration, but check out the album for yourself to see how it hits you.

Three Standout Tracks: "Get Got," "Hustle Bones" and "Bitch Please."

Score: 9.5/10

Hannah's Take: I have never given "The Money Store" a full listen before Matt chose it as one of his personal favorites from the decade, and I have to admit I was wildly impressed.

Really, I only had a vague familiarity with Death Grips before this edition. The violent energy consistent throughout the record had me hooked from the beginning track. Every song managed to show up with contagious energy, present both in the synth and in Stefan Burnett's raging raps. This electronic mania is particularly present in "Lost Boys" and "The Cage," some of the most energetic moments throughout the album. I like the intersect this record has; it hits the sweet spot between rock and rap that many naysayers say is either obnoxious or impossible.

The tail end of the record did drag a bit, as the final four tracks didn't have nearly as much differentiation as the rest of "The Money Store." Even writing that feels nitpicky to me, though, as I thoroughly enjoyed my time with this album.

I don't know how I went so long without giving it an in-depth listen. I completely understand why Matt chose this as one of his best of the decade, and going forward, I'll probably consider it one of the best of the 2010s as well.

Three Standout Tracks: "The Fever (Aye Aye)," "Lost Boys" and "Blackjack."

This is my all-time favorite song. Between the beat and the lyrics, it's impossible to not want to dance when you hear it.


Favorite lyrics: "And everything is going to the beat"

The men's ice hockey team played its Stroke Awareness game this past weekend against Oswego. The result was a 4-5 loss in a thrilling game.

Knocked down, but not knocked out

The Buffalo Bills lost a tough game to the Baltimore Ravens on Sunday afternoon. Baltimore dominated Buffalo, winning by a score of 24-17. The Ravens are the best team in the AFC and arguably the best in the whole league. They got the lead early in this game and never gave it up en route to their ninth straight win.

The Bills offense struggled all game versus this elite Ravens defense. They never could get into a rhythm, and Josh Allen couldn't seem to connect with his pass catchers. The Bills offensive line got bulldozed over on almost every play and did not give Allen time to let plays develop. This was a big reason for the struggles on the offensive side of the ball on Sunday.

Buffalo's defense, which ranks at number three in the league, continued to have an amazing performance. They held the Ravens to 257 yards of total offense, and held Lamar Jackson to 40 yards rushing. This is impressive, because Baltimore's offense is averaging 400 total yards a game, and it was Jackson's lowest rushing total this season.

With everything the Buffalo Bills defensive did to stop the MVP candidate quarterback, the entire team did not step up to the plate to win the game. This sets the Bills back to a 9-4 record on the season and is just one game up for the fifth seed in the AFC playoff picture.

The Bills' next game might be the most important one they have had all season. The Buffalo Bills play the Pittsburgh Steelers on Sunday Night Football this week. This is the first time since 2007 that the Bills will play on Sunday night under the bright lights.

For the Bills, it is a win and in scenario. If they can win this game on Sunday, they will clinch a playoff spot. On the other hand, if they lose this game, the road to the playoffs gets a lot harder with the Steelers and Titans right behind them.

It should be a great football game as the Buffalo Bills look to get to 10 wins for the first time since 1999, and secure a spot in the playoffs. The Bills will play the Steelers at Heinz Field on Sunday, Dec. 16 at 8:20 p.m. on NBC.

Can Jack Eichel save the Sabres' season?
