But when their name was announced as the best of the rest, Maciejewski said "We just jumped up. We were just hugging, a few people started crying . . . it was an awesome feeling."

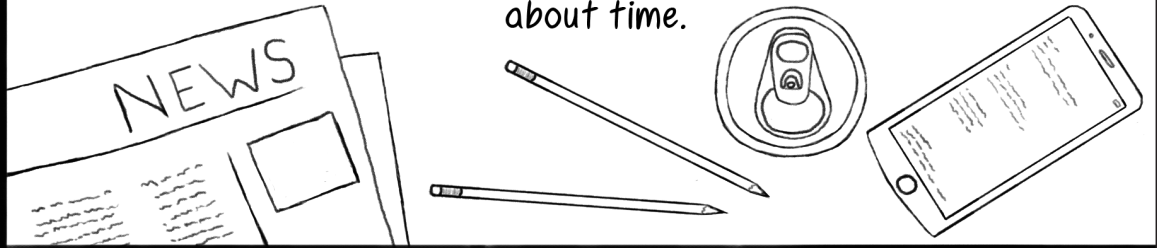
Throughout my college career, I've learned to accept any free beer.



When I was asked to write this review,

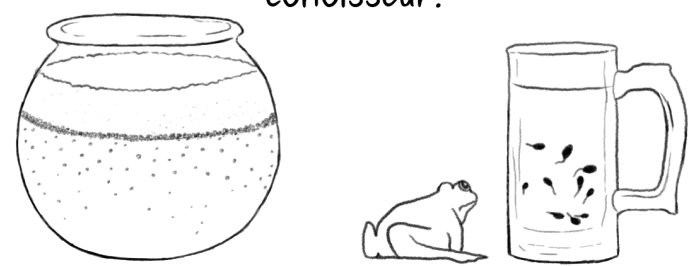


the first thought that went through my head was: it's about time.



I have to warn you though, I'm no beer connoisseur.

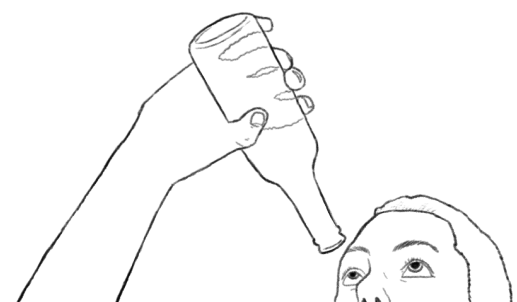
Nonetheless, I can tell the difference between beer and pond water.



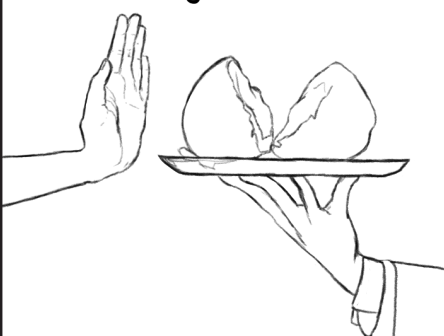

Generously described as a summer cream ale with a kick of cocunut, there was no cocunut to be found.

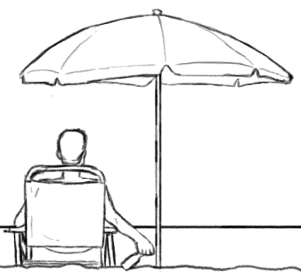


If you're into light cream ales and hate coconut, this may actually be the beer for you.

Just know that I would already be black-out hammered so I wouldn't have to actually taste the beer.



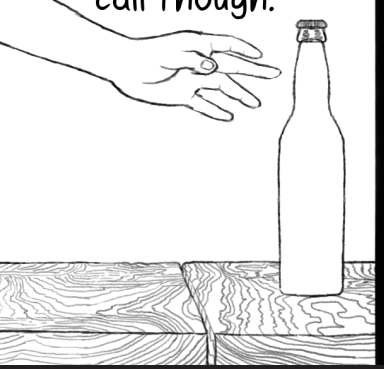

Like I said, I'll never turn down a free beer.

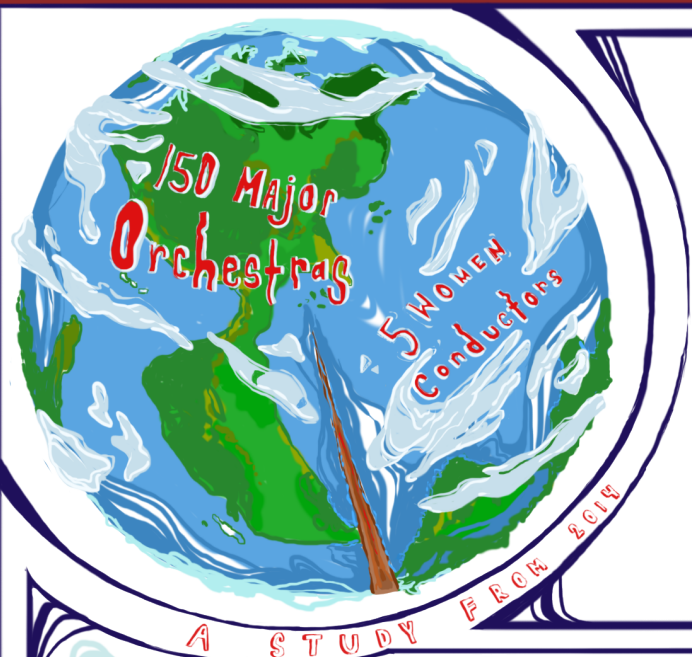

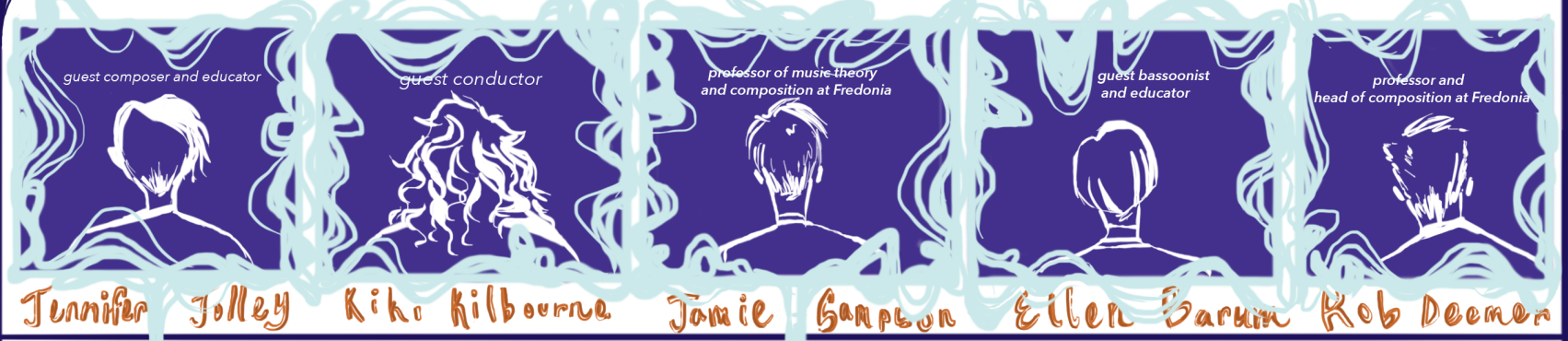

Clint Holmes, the son of an American-American jazz musician and a British opera singer, grew up in Farnham, N.Y., just 18.3 miles away from the Fredonia campus.

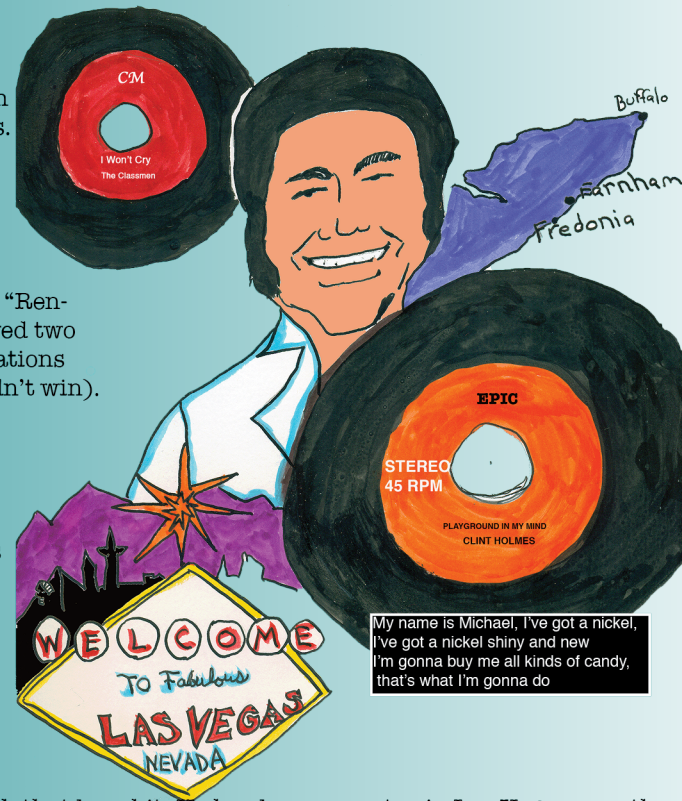
His 2017 album, "Rendezvous," received two Grammy nominations (although he didn't win).

He returned to Buffalo many times to co-host the annual Variety Kids telethon on WKBW-TV.

Around the time he graduated from high school, he made his first record, a doo-wop 45 with a group called the Classmen. He wrote both sides ("I'm Warning You"/"I Won't Cry").

He was a vocal music student at SUNY Fredonia in the mid-1960s before going into the U.S. Army, where he sang in the elite Army Chorus during the Vietnam War era.

A civilian again, he recorded his only Billboard Top 100 hit, "Playground in my Mind," in 1972. It went to No. 2 on the singles chart and has sold hundreds of thousands, if not millions, of copies over the years

But Holmes' career didn't end with that lone hit. He has become a star in Las Vegas over the past 40 years. He had a long-running headlining show at Harrah's Casino, which named its main showroom for him.

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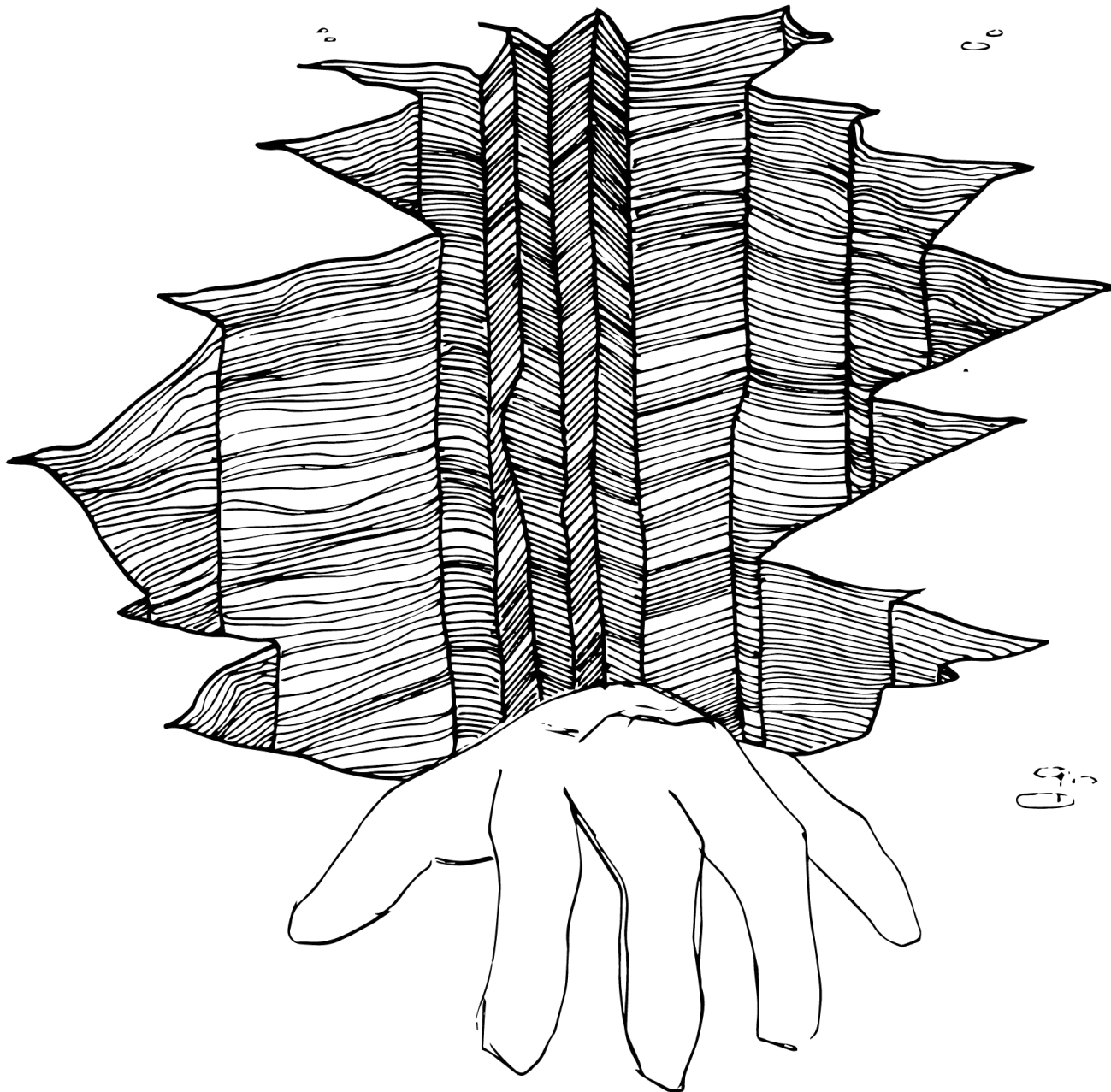

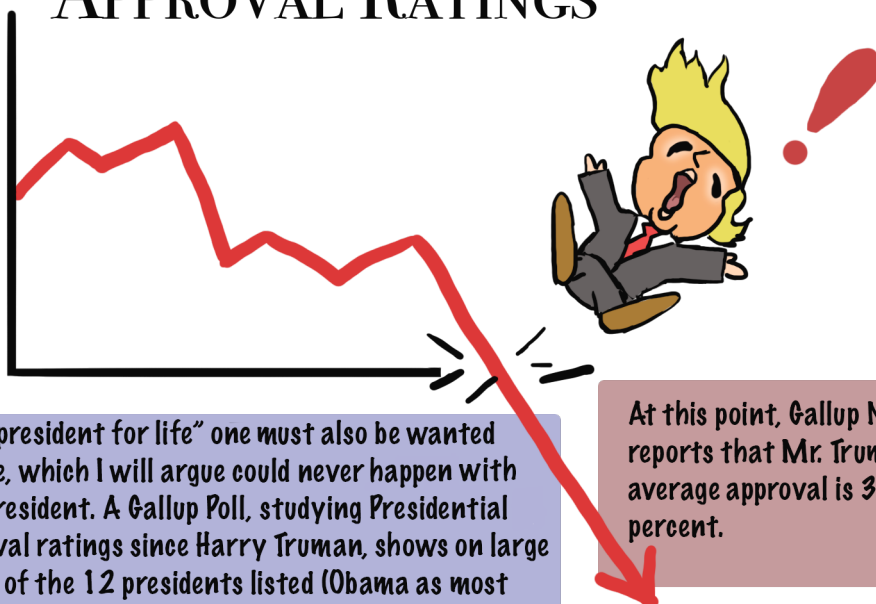
Only in modern American history have we proposed an amendment that sets presidential term limits, that being the Twenty-Second Amendment which was ratified in 1951. Despite the US only having such term limits in writing, the precedent for two term limits has been ingrained from the beginning of our democracy. The New York Times Editorial Board alludes to George Washington's reluctance to run for president more than once. "[Washington] pursued a second term in 1792 only at the urging of his cabinet, and in 1796, when he insisted it was time to step down, he famously warned that not to do so risked a return to the very tyranny Americans had fought to overthrow," the board wrote.

Before the ratification of the Twenty-Second Amendment, only one president served more than two terms, and that was Franklin Delano Roosevelt. Roosevelt was set to complete his fourth term when he died in office in 1945. This couldn't have happened without the support of his nation and his action of great leadership. In the midst of the Great Depression, Roosevelt launched the New Deal which helped to stabilize America's shattered economy and after the attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941, the country was behind him in launching the US into World War II.

To be "president for life" one must also be wanted for life, which I will argue could never happen with any president. A Gallup Poll, studying Presidential Approval ratings since Harry Truman, shows on large trend: of the 12 presidents listed (Obama as most recent), all but three presidents had lower approvals than where they started.

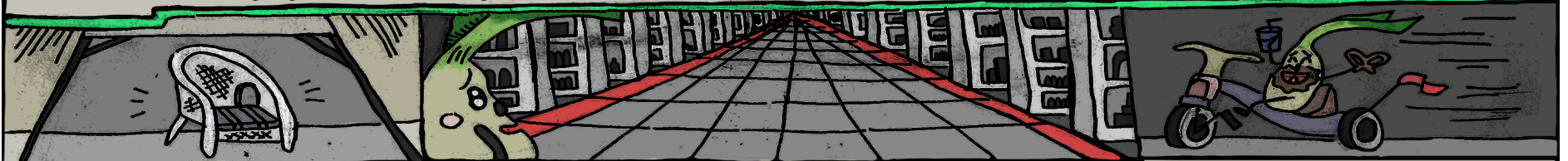
The Adventures of Hal Scallion
