Fredonia's new president appointed — Dr. Stephen H. Kolison, Jr.

Fredonia's new president, Dr. Stephen H. Kolison, Jr. was officially announced this afternoon over a virtual SUNY Board of Trustees' meeting.

The formal meeting took place at 1:15 p.m. and was made viewable to the public on the official SUNY website.

Dr. Kolison was introduced by Chancellor Dr. Kristina Johnson,

where she stated that he has served as Executive Vice President and Provost at The University of Indianapolis since April 2017.

His contributions there include the addition of 10 new degree programs, the establishment of three new faculty tracks, developing — as well as executing — an improved academic plan and more. This helped lead to the restoration of the university's status as a Carnegie Community Engagement University.

Prior to this, Dr. Kolison also served as Associate Vice President for Academic Programs, Education Innovation and Governance at The University of Wisconsin Administration from 2008 to 2017, where he worked his way up through various leadership positions.

Dr. Kolison gained his Bachelor of Science from the University of

Liberia and his master's and PhD degrees in forest economics from lowa State University and holds four post-doctoral certificates from Harvard University in topics such as educational management and negotiations in leadership.

Dr. Kolison was welcomed to the meeting by other members of the board.

"Thank you for this tremendous opportunity and confidence," said Kolison.

"You see, for a man who was told in the second grade that he

would not amount to anything because he suffered from dyslexia, this appointment is remarkable, and I hope it will inspire all students everywhere to never, ever give up."

Kolison also addressed Fredonia students along with faculty and members of the community in his speech expressing his excitement in being the university's new president.

"I am overjoyed to have the opportunity to serve you regardless of your background... The State University of New York at Fredonia is your university, you belong," said Kolison.

"I will work hard each day to ensure that you are successful in your endeavors. To faculty and staff, you are my partners in the advancement of our university, and to the citizens of the city of Fredonia and in neighboring communities, I am going to be one of you and a strong partner in a way to advance our region," he said.

Fredonia students' safer reopening plan endorsed by University Senate, has yet to be enforced

On July 1, SUNY Fredonia released a reopening plan for students, faculty and staff returning to campus this upcoming fall semester.

Classes will be quite different from previous semesters with precautions such as social distancing, limited capacity in buildings and mandated face coverings being put into effect.

Various institutions are requiring students to be tested for COVID-19 prior to returning to campus. However, this is not being enforced at Fredonia.

Fredonia students Brad Brown, Elizabeth Hahn and Ava Knapp have written an open letter to SUNY and to Gov. Cuomo expressing their concern for this lack of testing. A petition to advocate for a safer reopening plan is circulating online and is close to reaching 1,000 signatures.

Brown, Knapp and Hahn discussed the letter and petition with administration during the University Senate meeting on Monday, July 27.

The University Senate voted 42-1 to endorse the petition, however this does not mean testing will be mandated prior to students' return to campus.

This means that the Senate supports the petition, but as of now, the requests in the letter are not being enforced.

Outside of Fredonia, junior exercise science major, Ava Knapp, and senior biology major, Elizabeth Hahn are organizing congressional meetings with Partners in Health Engage in order to organize an outbreak prevention plan.

Fredonia's reopening plan does not follow all of the reopening guidelines from the United University Professions; therefore, Hahn and Knapp collaborated with Brown, a senior biochemistry major, to compose the petition and letter. The United University Professions, according to their website, "is the nation's largest higher education union, representing the faculty and professional staff of the SUNY system."

Their guidelines for reopening were "developed carefully" with union representation, and align with Gov. Cuomo's NY Forward plan.

A subsection of their reopening plan is devoted to the importance of testing for all students and faculty prior to their return to campus.

Hahn said that behavior-based prevention is not enough to keep Fredonia's small population healthy.

A combination of social distancing and wearing face coverings along with adequate and regular testing will significantly decrease the likelihood of an outbreak on campus.

Brown, Hahn and Knapp believe that "SUNY Fredonia remains ill-prepared to handle inevitable outbreaks of COVID-19 on campus. The decision to bring students back to campus without any testing is shortsighted and purely motivated by profits and a complete disregard for the safety of our students, faculty and community."

This letter and petition were sent to a plethora of leaders and administrators at Fredonia, including SUNY's Interim Chancellor, Robert Megna, Interim Provost at Fredonia, Dr. Kevin Kearns, SUNY Fredonia President, Dr. Stephen Kolison Jr. and Vice President for Enrollment & Student Services, Dr. Cedric Howard.

The goal in writing this letter and petition is to ensure that SUNY Fredonia administrators reassess the reopening plans, which "directly contradict the best practices and guidelines for COVID-19 testing that were laid out by the New York State Reopening New York Higher Education Guidelines and the United University Professions," Brown said.

In Summer Memo #4, however, Fredonia said that the CDC does not recommend entry testing of all returning students, faculty and staff for COVID-19 because it has not been systematically studied.

Despite this statement from the CDC, some private institutions in New York State such as St. Bonaventure University, Syracuse University and Cornell University are all mandating testing for returning students and school personnel.



COVID-19 cases are increasing and spreading among people in their 20s and 30s, and many of these people are asymptomatic.

Without adequate testing, students may return to campus unknowingly carrying the virus, thus spreading it throughout the campus community.

Senior molecular genetics major, Emilee Stenson, has also been a strong advocate for this issue.

She stressed the importance of continuing to call for proper testing despite Fredonia's statement on the issue.

Stenson said that advocacy for this cause can be demonstrated in other ways.

For instance, students can continue to show their support for COVID-19 testing by speaking with administration and staying informed through credible, scientific sources.

Stenson recognizes that socializing is a major part of the college experience, but said that public health needs to matter more than economic profits and social discomfort.

"I urge the administration to seriously consider what could happen if testing is not provided to catch cases early on and the high likelihood that students may not follow guidelines," said Stenson.

"Keep us safe, test the student body and wear masks."

Senior political science major and class of 2021 president, Lylens Lubin, said that although he believes testing plays a pivotal role in maintaining a healthy campus this semester, SUNY is still hesitant to enforce testing due to the uncertainty of its effectiveness.

Lubin suggested that students take initiative and get a test prior to their return to campus, regardless of whether it's mandated or not.

"The only people that can ensure the safest possible reopening are ourselves," said Lubin.

"We should all have the human decency to keep each other and ourselves safe from exposure. Masks are here to protect us, not control us. The media has contaminated this situation with a bunch of false narratives that have turned it into a political problem rather than a human health problem," he said.

A BJ's Review: Cooler, Marquee Grand & Fortunato

On Feb. 19th, BJ's hosted its regular bi-weekly music series with Last Call Entertainment — something that has become a staple of Fredonia's music scene and has garnered sort of a cult status due to it's repeating acts and fans.

Joining together this week were three exciting bands including Cooler, Marquee Grand and Fortunato.

The show began with "Fortunato," a group out of Rochester with a specialty in spaced out and vibey post punk instrumental music.

The group played longspanned instrumentals that were heavy and not like that of a normal jam band. Often they would have samples in their songs or spoken word audio introducing the songs.

The group described their sound to be sonically driven "from contemporary post rock bands like Caspian, Explosions in The Sky or Russian Circles."

Other influences that don't reflect the groups sonic nature include everything

from The Beatles, to Deafheaven and author Kurt Vonnegut who has, according to the group, "Piqued some of [our] interest in sci-fi, but his themes of social equality and the paradoxically barbaric nature of modern society inform our worldview."

Interestingly, the band set up like no other group I have seen, with two members on the stage and the other two in front of the stage near the audience. This, they said was more out of necessity for the amount of gear they had.

Speaking with them later after the show, I learned that it was not only their first time playing in Fredonia but was also their first time sharing a lineup with the other groups.

They said of the fellow groups, "We hadn't played with Marquee Grand or Cooler before, but we certainly hope to again in the future. They're good people who make good music and we couldn't believe how fortunate we were to share the stage with them."

Next to take the stage was Marquee Grand, the first local band to sell out Rec Room in Buffalo during their album release show just this January.

The EP that is responsible for the record-breaking debut channels The 1975 as well as Blink-182 and features a healthy dose of catchy choruses.

The alternative rock group cites Gin Blossoms, Green Day and The Wallflowers as musical influences during their founding in 2015.

At BJ's, Marquee Grand's performance was a very crowd participatory event that called for a lot of singing along and dancing in the crowd.

Cooler, who has played at BJ's more in the past, wrapped up the night and played a fantastic set decked with their own light show including a neon lit flamingo and parrot.

The 3-piece group gets a heavy sound that seems unimaginable for three instruments to take on but is somehow achieved.

Last year, when I reviewed a BJ's show that Cooler was playing, their single "Metal Moths" had received over 175,000 streams.

The group has well surpassed that now and has over 230,000 streams on the catchy tune. The group remarked of the tune during the show that it was about, "Saying some sh*t you can't take back."

Cooler has recently come out with a new single, titled: "Gentlemen," which is a truly catchy song with ambient guitar and chill vocals.

The group played an incredible set and was a perfect end to the night for all in attendance.

Jiggy By Nature: Fredonia-born brand plans to take over the world

While walking around Fredonia's campus and being involved in the community, you may have noticed a spark in social media presence for the student-run business, Jiggy By Nature.

You might've also come across the name on stickers around campus, on students' laptops or across the chests of some students' sweatshirts.

But what is the vision behind the name?

Abdullah Yusuf, Andre Cowan, Lloyd Ansah and Mamadou Diallo had this epiphany when they were just freshmen at Fredonia, inspiring them to start up their clothing brand, Jiggy By Nature.

The men behind Jiggy By Nature, also known as JBN, continuously update and revamp their collections, products and ideas to fit the trends. Their designs include items such as hoodies, graphic t-shirts, sweatpants, shorts, hats and more.

Jiggy By Nature doubles as a clothing and lifestyle brand, initially seeing success and winning the hearts of many with their focus on positivity and comfort through their social media presence.

The slogan listed on their website, "Defining true expressions of fashion through music and comfort," shows their audience the true meaning of Jiggy By Nature, which is "more than just a brand," according to Yusuf.

He emphasized the fact that Jiggy By Nature initially started out as "just clothes," but the brand has grown to become more than that. Their newest addition, Cozy By Voice, exemplifies this.

Diallo said that Cozy By Voice was a suggestion for the brand by Ansah.

"It is an entertainment company that markets not only Jiggy By Nature, but music itself through fashion," Diallo said.

"Fashion and music go hand-in-hand... with that being said, representing your style of fashion and your taste of music together in your everyday lifestyle — that's what our generation lives for," he said.

Jiggy By Nature takes great inspiration for Cozy By Voice from influential modern artists, including A\$AP Mob and A\$AP Rocky, who market clothing brands alongside their music.

Ansah said that the goal for the artists associated with Cozy By Voice is to help with networking, to use their platform to update their audience with new releases and music videos and to promote their social media accounts.

These promoted artists include Ansah himself (NY LLOYD), Buddha Man and YoungRichoo.

Cozy By Voice is also the home of The Plug Radio, which provides their audience with, "all the latest updates in music, pop-culture and NYC's underground talent."

According to Yusuf, Jiggy By Nature is working to showcase the efforts of various up-and-coming creators and entrepreneurs, stressing the importance of networking. The brand has networked and taken other contributors under their wing for the sake of expanding to different genres of art and fashion. One of them is Messiah Hill, who has helped Jiggy By Nature tremendously in terms of creative design and contributing new ideas. "He's basically our first official designer outside of the founders.

From making multiple logos to doing photoshoots and more, he has been a huge addition to our brand and we are grateful to have him," said Yusuf.

The men behind JBN are aware of the platform they have and the power they hold to continue to keep their audience informed about the current social climate.

"We're using our social media as a way to talk to the people," said Cowan. "We posted a lot of things about the [Black Lives Matter] movement, we're showing that we care because we are Black men. Our words speak to a lot of people."

The Jiggy By Nature team agrees that the sentiment of having conversations and seeing people's real-time reactions to today's issues is far more valuable than putting something on a t-shirt.

Ansah said that people find comfort in Jiggy By Nature's message and story alone.

"Our skin is our nature. We are four Black men... in some spaces that we enter, some people will look at us a certain way, or look down on us in a sense. So I think our brand, designs and message overall show where we stand and who we are," he said.

Yusuf said that he feels the brand has evolved to "set an example" for the Black community in Fredonia, in the same way they previously looked up to upperclassmen. He also expressed the importance of representing the potential of aspiring entrepreneurs, no matter their age or skin color.

Jiggy By Nature hasn't let the pandemic stop them — there are a lot of things in the works for them, or "everything you could think of," said Diallo.

"We're working on skateboards, lighters, stickers, keychains, face masks and shorts right now. We want to have something for everyone; everyone deserves to be a part of JBN," he said.

He encouraged fans of Jiggy By Nature to sit tight and stay tuned because there are "big things in the works" for the brand that cannot yet be shared.





No one really talks about the transition from a teenager to adult, even though this time is often nerve-wracking and composed entirely of change.

Questions spiral in a high school senior's mind: "What college should I go to?" or "What do I want to do for the rest of my life?"

This added onto the pressure. Choosing the right major, the right college, finding the right friends, joining clubs and maintaining above a 3.2 GPA made me nearly keel over.

But what I did not know was that it is okay to not know how my future would turn out.

Living in the digital age is hard. Instagram models, YouTubers and TikTok stars seem to have perfect lives.

When comparing millionaires to the average person, it's inevitable that the regular people will feel inadequate and insecure.

Nearly everyone presents a fake persona to the world online, trying to only show the best sides of themselves.

It's often hard not to fall into a pit when being surrounded by people that seem to have their lives together.

But just because something seems perfect, it does not mean it necessarily is.

Knowing this has the potential to change everything. Knowing that it's okay to be uncertain, confused and lost is an important step in finding how to get back on track.

Entering college as a freshman feels like a fever dream at first. Everything is so different from what it once was.

Stepping onto a new campus with thousands of new people is scary for most, if not terrifying.

In the fall 2019 semester, 1,006 first-time first-year students stepped onto Fredonia's campus, all of them experiencing many of

the same emotions without even knowing each other.

One-thousand six newcomers entered a campus that has a total of 4,463 students.

Yet Fredonia is considered a small campus.

Transitioning from a class of 60 people to about 1,000 was difficult, but not impossible.

It was hard; I won't lie. Sometimes I'd find myself overwhelmed with stress from classes and clubs, all while trying to balance a healthy social life.

At the end of the day, I'd often look in the mirror and ask myself, "Am I enjoying what I'm doing?"

Most of the time, I didn't have an answer.

I knew I should be, and I knew I wanted to be. Yet, I was instead filled with self-doubt.

The next day the Blue Devils won an overtime thriller against Potsdam 94-87, with Katie Pitcher and Audrey Craffey both scoring 27. The women's team will also play New Paltz Friday night and Oneonta Saturday afternoon at home.

They have the SUNYAC Championships February 19-20 in Buffalo. The women's track and field team competed at the Utica College Blue and Orange Invitational this past weekend. Many solid performances at the meet, including Maddie Sohl in the triple jump, with a seventh-place finish, as well as a seventh-place finish in the 4x400 meter relay by Sarah Buckley, Emily Fish, Morgan Ashton and Ali Dixon.

As for the men's track and field team, they too traveled to Utica with some solid performances themselves. Collin Barmore ran a 1:57.16 in the 800-meter race, taking third place overall and qualifying for the regional championship. He was also a part of the 4x400 meter relay that took second place, along with Will Guagliardo, Toby Onuoha and Alec Wright. Onuoha also took fourth in the high jump and fifth in the triple jump. Other scoring performances include Daniel Sudyn taking sixth in the triple jump and a sixth-place finish for a second 4x400 relay team consisting of Ivan Torres, Griffin Dombroske, Matt Erman and Topher Elkins.

Next up for the Men and Women's Track and Field team is the SUNYAC Championships hosted at Brockport University on Friday, February 28 at 3 pm and Saturday, February 29 at 10 am.

Fredonia to introduce alternative transportation for inclement weather

To combat this stress, Jess Tuitt, the head of the university Department of Transportation, has set in motion a plan to for more-efficient transport for students.




